Leadership and Ministry in Wesleyan Contexts Winter/Fall Semester, October 10 – December 12, 2023

Introduction into the topic

Leadership is such an integral part of ministry that we tend to take it for granted. Occasionally we affirm someone for their "natural" leadership skills. More often complaints are heard about deficits in this area. Leadership involves leading structures and processes, but one way or other, it has always to do with people. In the ministry context it is focused on God's Kingdom and the mission of the Church.

Leadership involves dispositions, skills and knowledge, and the work of God is served if leaders – lay and clergy, young and old, women and men, persons in authority position and without formal positions – have opportunities to develop skills, cultivate dispositions, and deepen their understanding of what it means to be a leader in the Church.

Therefore, we offer lectures around questions about leadership in the church in the fall of 2023 as a continuation of the MTSE lecture series. Different topics will be covered by experienced leaders and lecturers from across Europe, offering perspectives from the Wesleyan/Methodist tradition such as,

- The theology and spirituality of leadership
- Various leadership models
- Supervision and mentorship
- Goal-setting and vision casting
- Management and delegation
- Boundaries and role clarity in leadership
- · The leader's self care and time management
- Leading change in a congregation or ministry area
